- Membership: AAESS membership has increased more than 10% this year. As always, there is strength in numbers and joining with your professional colleagues will help advance and safeguard our profession, for the benefit of all. Please ensure that you renew when the time comes and that you encourage your colleagues to do so. As you will see from the rest of the report, AAESS has worked very hard in the last year to provide even more tangible benefits of AAESS membership.
- **Web site:** The "new" AAESS web site provides an increasingly useful resource for our AAESS members. In particular, I would like to acknowledge the commitment of Chris Tzar to this initiative. This is just the start of exercise physiology being recognised as a mainstream and well-established profession among GPs and others.
- AAESS Conference: I personally believe that the AAESS conference was one of the greatest success stories for our young organisation in the last year. The overwhelming feedback was "it was a great event" and "can't wait for the next one". There was a unique atmosphere that I haven't experienced at other conferences and I think this was achieved by having a very focussed program and a great mix of likeminded professionals. Of course, it would not have been the success that it was without the hard work of all involved, specially Mark Brown. I thank all those who supported our inaugural conference and I hope you will all return to our next conference in 2006.
- **NUCAP:** After a slow start, the National University Course Accreditation Program (NUCAP) has gathered steam and the first round is nearing completion. This is largely due to the great organisational skills of our project officer Amanda Smyth. I firmly believe in NUCAP and I think that it sends an important message that an exercise and sport science degree is a quality degree and worthy of accreditation. A lot of unrecognised work has gone into developing the NUCAP documentation and procedures and AAESS should be very proud of its leadership in this area. • AAESS Survey: For the first time AAESS committed to surveying our members to find out what you think we are doing right and what we can do better to service our members. Vice President (Sports Science) Report

- Completed input to Corporate Review being collated by Zorica Babic.
- Attended and participated in AAESS Board meeting after the AAESS Conference.
- Attended and was a member of the Organising Committee of the most impressive Inaugural AAESS National Conference. One of the best conferences I have attended. Why? The networking, the bridging of theory and practice, quality of speakers, and level of organisation. We need to keep this momentum going!

Treasurer's Report

Barry Ridge PhD

The financial statements for the Company for the period 1st July 2003 to 30th June 2004 are attached. A loss of \$2,401 was made during the financial year. The main source of income was membership and accreditation fees – an increase of 20% on the previous year. A small amount of income was generated through bank interest. Income from donations and Conferences is abnormal and related to the AAESS Conference 2004. The final reconciliation from this Conference is almost complete and it would appear that there will be a small profit of \$334. A great effort for our inaugural AAESS Conference. I am sure that Conference Chair, Dr Phil Hamdorf will have more to say on this matter soon. There is also to be a distribution from the SMA Conference in 2003 of \$7602 but it has not been received as yet.

Expenditure in 2004 was somewhat higher than last year. This can in part be attributed to Conference 2004 (advertising, Conference, printing, sundry) and the salary of the National University Course Accreditation Program (NUCAP) project officer salary. Income from both of these projects will not show until the next financial year. Committee travel costs are significantly lower in 2004 due the face-to-face Board meeting being held in conjunction with the AAESS Conference 2004 in Brisbane. Legal advice was sought to advise AAESS on risk and insurance programs.

The Board has received approval from ASIC to change its financial year to 31st December 2005. This will mean that AAESS will have a transitional year of 18 months from 1st July 2004 until 31st December 2005. The annual general meeting will therefore need to be held within 5 months of year end – presumably at the next AAESS Conference.

This year our auditors for many years, Thomas, Noble & Russell from Lismore, NSW resigned. As a group of NSW country accountants they believed that they could not service our requirements. The Board has recommended that Wayne Hardy-Smith from Minto Heights, NSW be appointed as auditor and ASIC has recently approved of this change.

I commend the Financial Reports to the membership and move that:

Queensland State Chapter Report

It has been other year of progress for the AAESS movement in Queensland. Our membership has increased steadily within the state and this has been most evident in the student member ranks due to the enthusiasm of many of these students in wanting to participate in our inaugural conference in Brisbane earlier this year. The conference was an extremely successful conduit in providing students with a vision of our association and wanting to become part of the AAESS movement. Our next conference organising committee must look to strengthen this association between student non-members and our national conference particularly within the host State. The following is a summary of our strategies and achievements for the year:

Improving the AAESS Profile

- The Chapter has been working closely with Workcover Queensland to discuss the recognition of our members for Physical Conditioning Services.
- We have been liaising with Q-COMP over the last few years in order to ensure that our members are recognised and acknowledged for their skills and expertise in rehabilitation. Last year we became aware of the Allied Health Table of Costs Review and submitted a report outlining the chapters concerns about inequalities in the current table. Our objectives were two fold:
 - o Modify the current wording of the 'Return to Work Services' section in the Occupational Rehabilitation and Other Rehabilitation Services Table of Costs
 - o Address the current discrepancy between chargeable fees for identical services between Physiotherapists and Exercise Physiologists

We will be continuing this debate with Q-COMP into the new year.

- We have assisted the National body with the respect to insurance issues for our members.
- Developed of a list of members and coverage details that can provide testing services for the Queensland Ambulance Service.
- We have developed a list of accredited members to provide services as part of the Brisbane North Division of General Practice Coordinated Care Trial for Chronic Disease.

Improving Member Satisfaction

- Each year the Chapter provides two awards to fourth year students from UQ and QUT. These awards provide a one year membership to the AAESS and \$125 in cash.
- A successful continuing education workshop in the wet labs at UQ improving the clinical practice of Exercise Physiologists and we will be undertaking a Hydrotherapy Workshop for our members later in the year.

I would like to take the opportunity to thank a fantastic team who have made light work of my role as President for 2004.

Scope

The financial report and directors' responsibility

The financial report comprises the statement of financial position, statement of financial performance, statement of cash flows, accompanying notes to the financial statements, and the directors' declaration for the Australian Association for Exercise and Sports Science Limited (the company), for the year ended 30 June 2004

The directors of the company are responsible for the preparation and true and fair presentation of the financial report in accordance with the Corporations Act 2001. This includes responsibility for the maintenance of adequate accounting records and internal controls that are designed to prevent and detect fraud and error, and for the accounting policies and accounting estimates inherent in the financial report.

Audit Approach

I have conducted an independent audit in order to express an opinion on the financial report to members of the company. My audit was planned and performed in accordance with Australian Auditing Standards in order to provide reasonable assurance as to whether the financial report is free of material misstatement. The nature of an audit is influenced by factors such as the use of professional judgement, selective testing, the inherent limitations of internal control, and the availability of persuasive rather than conclusive evidence. Therefore, an audit cannot guarantee that all material misstatements have been detected.

I have performed procedures to assess whether in all material respects the financial report presents fairly, in accordance with the Corporations Act 2001, including compliance with Accounting Standards and other mandatory financial reporting requirements in Australia, a view which is consistent with our understanding of the company's financial position, and of its performance as represented by the results of its operations and cash flows.

I have formed my audit opinion on the basis of these procedures, which included:

- examining, on a test basis, information to provide evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial report, and
- assessing the appropriateness of the accounting policies and disclosures and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by the directors.

While I considered the effectiveness of management's internal controls over financial reporting when determining the nature and extent of our procedures, my audit was not designed to provide absolute assurance on internal controls.

INDEPENDENT AUDITORS' REPORT TO THE MEMBERS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2004

Independence

As auditor, I am required to be independent of the company and free of interests which could be incompatible with integrity and objectivity. In respect of this engagement, I have followed the independence requirements set out by The Institute of Chartered Accountants in Australia, the Corporations Act 2001 and the Auditing and Assurance Standards Board.

In addition to my statutory audit work, I may be engaged to undertake other services for the company. These services are disclosed in Note 3 to the financial statements. In my opinion and that of the company's directors, the provision of these services has not impaired my independence.

Qualification

It is not practicable for the company to establish adequate accounting controls over the receipt of cash transactions until their initial entry into the accounting records. Accordingly it is not possible for my examination to include audit procedures which allow me to conclude that all cash receipt transactions have been recorded in the accounting records of the company. In my opinion, all transactions recorded have been properly accounted for by the company.

Qualified Audit Opinion

In my opinion, except for the matter referred to in the qualification paragraph, the financial report of the Australian Association for Exercise and Sports Science Limited is in accordance with:

- a) the Corporations Act 2001, including:
 - i. giving a true and fair view of the company's financial position as at 30 June 2004 and of its performance and cashflows for the year ended on that date; and
 - ii. complying with Accounting Standards and the Corporations Regulations in Australia; and
- b) other mandatory professional reporting requirements in Australia.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2004

1. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The financial statements, which form part of the general purpose financial report, have been prepared in accordance with applicable Accounting Standards, other authoritative pronouncements of the Australian Accounting Standards Board, Urgent Issues Group Consensus Views and disclosure requirements of the Corporations Act. The financial statements have also been prepared on the basis of historical costs and do not take into account changing money values or, except where stated, current valuations of non-current assets. The financial statements have also been prepared on a going concern basis which contemplates the continuity of normal business activities, the realisation of assets and the settlement of liabilities in the ordinary course of business. The accounting policies have been consistently applied, unless otherwise stated.

a) Taxation

The Company has been granted exemption from income tax under section 50-5 of the Income Tax Assessment Act.

b) Segment Information

The company is predominantly engaged in sports science activities conducted in Australia and within the Education Industry.

c) Revenue

Revenue from the sale of goods is recognised upon the delivery of goods to customers. Interest revenue is recognised on a proportional basis taking into account the interest rates applicable to the financial assets. Revenue from the rendering of a service is recognised upon the delivery of the service to the customers. Contributions of non-current assets are measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable.

d) Goods and services tax

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of goods and services tax (GST), except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Tax Office (ATO). In these circumstances the GST is recognised as part of the costs of acquisition of the assets or as part of an item of expense.

Receivables and payables are stated with the amount of GST included.

The net amount of GST recoverable, or payable to, the ATO is included as a current asset or liability in the statement of financial position.

Cash flows are included in the statement of cash flows on a gross basis. The GST component of cash flows arising from investing and financing activities which are recoverable from or payable to, the ATO are classified as operating cash flows.

11. FINANCIAL INSTRUMENTS

(a) Terms, Conditions and Accounting Policies

The Company's accounting policies, including the terms and conditions of each class of financial asset, financial liability and equity instrument, both recognised and unrecognised at balance date are as follows:

Financial Assets

Receivables - Trade

Trade Receivables are carried at nominal amounts due less any provision for doubtful debts. A provision for doubtful debts is recognised when collection of the full nominal amount is no longer probable.

Financial Liabilities

Accounts Payable and Accruals (Note 6)

Liabilities are recognised for amounts to be paid in the future for goods and services received, whether or not billed to the company. Trade liabilities are normally settled on 30 day terms, unless otherwise advised by the trade creditor.

(b) Interest Rate Risk

The company's exposure to interest rate risks is minimal.

(c) Credit Risk Exposure

The company's maximum exposure to credit risk at balance date in relation to each class of recognised financial asset is the carrying amount of those assets as indicated in the statement of financial position.

(d) Net Fair Value of Financial Assets and Liabilities

The net fair value of cash and cash equivalents and non-interest bearing monetary financial assets and financial liabilities approximates their carrying value.

(e) Other Unrecognised Financial Assets

Members Guarantee: The company has a contingent asset available of \$606 arising from members guarantee in the event of winding up (refer Note 8).

Principal Activities

The principal activities of the company in the course of the financial year were the promotion, research and advancement of education in the areas of exercise and sports science and related fields and the setting of standards in the community of best practice in those areas.

DIRECTORS' REPORT CONT'D

Operating Result

The net loss earned by the company for the year was (\$2,403) (2003 - Loss \$17,523).

Review of Operations

The company earned revenue of \$132,914 for the year, primarily income from memberships and Accreditation Fees. The company's operations during the year resulted in a net loss of \$2,401. Expenses were primarily committee travel expenses, printing and staffing costs.
